# Jefferson Barracks Hit by High Winds. Trees Down throughout Park

On July 13, Wednesday afternoon, around 3:30 pm a heavy rain and severe winds burst upon South County knocking out electric power for over 200,000 locations and felling trees and branches throughout the area. Jefferson Barracks Park apparently was in the epicenter of this storm and suffered extensive damage to many trees in the park as did



the Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery. Although the latter was closed to the public the next day while clean up crews addressed the damage, the Park remained open as maintenance and forestry crews helped remove the scattered, broken limbs and began the work of cutting up the trees. Unfortunately, among the trees lost were numerous large, ancient oak trees that could well have seen Ulysses Grant or Robert E. Lee when they were stationed here at JB well over 150 years ago. The JB Visitor Center was closed the next day, as were all the museums, since electric was

not restored until the 16th. History staff managed to work on the new exhibit in the Old Ordnance Room which was the only building that did not lose electric service. Maintenance staff spent several days cleaning up and preparing for upcoming events.

### "R" You a JB Mystery Solver?

We are in the midst of a complete review and inventory of the over 12,000 objects in our Collection. Occasionally, we come across an object that is unidentified or unclassified. Last week, we came across this stamped aluminum or tin character with two eyelets that was accessioned in 1986. The information in our database

# JB's CCC Worker Statue Heads to Washington SP



Standing as a silent sentinel along Hancock Road since 1996, the CCC Worker Statue has served as an honor guard to the memory of thousands of young men in the 1930s who worked for the Civilian Conservation Corps here at JB. On July 18 it left JB. The statue, No. 2 in a series of over 60

sculptures produced, will be installed in Washington State Park near DeSoto in Missouri. Once known as Camp Thunderbird, the State Park is now operated by the Department of Natural Resources. It was begun by Company 1743, which consisted of young men from Nebraska, although

their ranks were later added to by men recruited at Jefferson Barracks from Company 694. As the State Park has a mission to honor the CCC legacy and the CCC Museum in JB closed in 2007, St. Louis County Parks graciously agreed to donate the sculpture to the State.


# Living History Hayrides on September 10 & 11
